Trade Unions oppose petrol price hike by protest rallies on 30 and 31-5-2012

All the central Trade unions of the country express deepest concern at the reckless decision of the Government to increase the price of petrol more than Rs. 7 per litre, unprecedented dose of increase so far, at a time when the economy is in deep crisis. CENTRAL TRADE UNIONS OPPOSE ATTEMPTS TO CLOSE DOWN RURAL BRANCHES OF BANKS

Recently the Government of India has advised the Public Sector Banks to close down their rural Branches in the villages and re-locate them at non-rural/urban areas if these branches do not earn profits.
